City Hall to be finished this fall

After more than three years of demolition, construction, and refurbishment, City Hall and the Police Department will be finished in early December and ready for City employees to occupy.

The City Hall parking lot, which has been usurped since September 2000 for construction use, has been refurbished as well and will be opened to the public at the same time.

The City Hall project has been completed in two stages. The first stage was to build the new, 35,000-square-foot addition to the City Hall and Police Department complex. That work was finished in October 2002.

Some City employees moved into their permanent quarters at that time, while other staffers were temporarily relocated

The workshops will give citizens an opportunity to weigh in on their ideas for Walnut Creek's future. They are the first of several public feedback sessions that will be scheduled through 2005 as the City updates its General Plan.

The General Plan is a blueprint for development and conservation for the community. It was last updated in 1989.

A seven-member steering committee comprising members of the various City commissions and City Treasurer Ron Cassano has been meeting twice a month

The annual Holiday Tree Lighting will be on Friday, Nov. 28, 5:30 p.m. at Civic Park.



Council approves 47-home Citrus Walk project in Woodlands

The City Council has cleared the way for converting a portion of the Woodlands Office Park into a 47-unit housing development on Citrus Circle just

east of Oak Grove Road.

The Council approved the Citrus Walk project on Sept. 16 amid strong support from the neighborhood, which worked with the developer and City planners to make the project amenable to neighboring property owners.

The project will convert 3.89 acres of the office park from office use to multi-family residential use. It will provide a mix of duets and condominiums, 10 percent of which will be affordable to moderate income buyers. Additionally, the attached housing units will likely be priced below the average new single family home in Walnut Creek.

The developer, Trumark Companies, has agreed to provide \$225,000 for schools attended by Woodlands children, upgrade the nearby Woodlands Cabana



Swim Club at a cost of more than \$300,000, and install a left-turn traffic signal at southbound Oak Grove and Citrus Avenue.

from Newell Avenue to the National Guard Armory on Carmel Drive to accommodate a 6-foot-diameter East Bay Municipal Utility District water pipeline. Work is expected to be done by late 2004.

He served as an Army master sergeant in the 92nd Armored Field Artillery in Korea in 1950-52. A 30-year member of the VFW, he is also chairman of the board of Lafayette War Veterans Inc., which oversees the Lafayette veterans memorial building.

The Walnut Creek Concert Band under the direction of Harvey Benstein will perform a concert following the ceremony.

In the event of rain, the ceremony will be moved into the Civic Park Community Center Assembly Hall.

since June to discuss a wide range of issues pertaining to the General Plan.

“The committee has come up with a vision and principles for Walnut Creek’s future which will be the main topic of discussion at the public workshops this fall,” said Senior Planner Janice Stern. “It’s so important for people in the community to attend and help shape the vision and principles so that we can adopt a General Plan that reflects a wide range of interests and desires.”

The City intends to hold a total of eight public workshops over the next two years, generally in the fall and spring of 2003 and 2004, and in spring 2005.

Street sweeping keeps leaves out of drains

As the leaves of autumn fall from Walnut Creek trees into Walnut Creek gutters, the City’s street sweepers are gearing up for their heaviest season.

Residents in the low-lying areas know just how important it is to keep gutters and storm drains clear of leaves and other debris as the rainy season approaches. Last year’s heavy rains caused flooding in some areas and City crews worked round the clock on those days to clear storm drains of leaves.

The City has two full-time operators working year-round to keep Walnut Creek’s 386 curb miles of streets clean. They stick to a rigorous street-sweeping schedule between the hours of 4 a.m. and 2 p.m. All residential streets are cleaned once a month, major arterials such as Ygnacio Valley Road are swept once a week, and downtown streets are swept three times a week. Street sweeping is required by state law and paid for by property taxes.

Keeping storm drains clear not only prevents local flooding but prevents untreated debris from contaminating our

natural waterways.

Property owners need to do their part by cleaning leaves out of the gutters in front of their homes and putting them in a recycling can for curbside pick-up.

The City has a handy street-sweeping schedule online at www.walnut-creek.org under “quick hits” that gives the precise day of the week your street is scheduled to be cleaned. If you don’t see your street on the schedule, call 943-5855.


City wins top state award for teen website

RealWC.org, the City’s online magazine made by teens for teens, was honored with a top state award in October.

The League of California Cities presented its prestigious Helen Putnam Award of Excellence to Walnut Creek in the category of community services and economic development.

The teen website, created in October 2000, is produced by a team of high school students to show area teens the various fun and healthy things they can do in Walnut Creek.

The site receives more than 100,000 hits a month and has been featured twice on the national “Tech TV” channel, the *Contra Costa Times*, the *San Francisco Chronicle*, and *Diablo and YM* magazines.

7,000 parking spaces await eager shoppers in downtown Walnut Creek

Parking just got easier in downtown Walnut Creek. Along with the influx of new stores, restaurants, and movie theaters that opened earlier this year, new off-street public parking has been created that brings to over 7,000 the number of spaces to be found downtown.


Two recent retail projects — Plaza Escuela and Olympia Place — created 1,224 free parking spaces in three parking structures that line Locust Street near Olympic Boulevard. That means there are now nearly 5,300 spaces of off-street parking (which doesn't include individual parking lots on store properties, such as Barnes & Noble and Ross, or metered parking lots such as the library and the City-owned lots).

Broadway Plaza and Broadway Pointe (Pottery Barn, Il Fornaio, etc.) already offer a total of 2,625 free parking spaces to its customers.

Additionally, the City of Walnut Creek operates three public garages with a total of 1,378 spaces (see box at left).

There is usually always parking available on the upper floors and roof at the municipal garages, and the Free Ride shuttle, a free service subsidized by the City, stops at both Locust Street garages.

Also, the City Council in September approved \$129,000 to install special digital message signs at the three City garages to alert approaching motorists of the number of vacant parking stalls. Those new signs are scheduled to be installed by next spring.

Parking is 50 cents/hour (up to a maximum of \$3) before 6 p.m. Users entering all three City garages after 6 p.m. will pay a \$2 flat fee. If parking for less than one hour after 6 p.m., the rate remains 50 cents/hour. Holiday hours for all three garages are the same as Sundays unless otherwise posted. Validated parking is available from many downtown businesses.



City Council Update

City's mid-year budget healthy

The City continues to maintain a healthy budget despite a significant decrease in investment earnings and a reduction in vehicle license fees (VLF).

That was the message delivered to the City Council Sept. 16 by Administrative Services Director Rosie Coan as the City marked the mid-way point in its two-year operating budget.


The revised revenue estimate for FY 2002-04 is \$89,734,251, which represents a \$450,000 increase due to an unanticipated increase in sales tax revenue.

The City's reserve fund has been adjusted from \$15.8 million to \$1.5 million to reflect the Council's decisions to designate \$13.3 million for a new downtown library and \$929,920 for the General Plan update.

Walnut Blvd. walkway OK'd

The City Council on Sept. 16 awarded a \$124,560 contract to Redgwick Construction Company to create a pedestrian walkway on the west side of Walnut Boulevard from Ygnacio Valley Road to Brasero Lane.

Walnut Boulevard is heavily used by Walnut Creek Intermediate School students. The walkway is part of the City's Safe Route to School program.



Council to consider Heather Farm Master Plan

The Walnut Creek City Council will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, Nov. 4 to consider adoption of a proposed master plan for Heather Farm Park. The plan being recommended by the Park, Recreation & Open Space Commission calls for several changes at the 100-acre park located on North San Carlos Drive. Those changes include building a new skate park across from the Clarke Swim Center on Heather Drive, eventually eliminating the equestrian center at the north end of the park and relocating the basketball courts there. A complete overhaul of the 23-year-old civic center includes new floors, ceilings, walls, lighting, and offices. Further, the

Police Department side has been seismically reinforced and a new, 1,000-square-foot community meeting room will be available on the third floor of City Hall.

A public open house will be scheduled early in 2004.

City Manager Mike Parness on Sept. 18 named Dan Richardson as Public Services Director, a post he was assigned on an interim basis in March.

Richardson, 52, a resident of Clayton, joined the department in January 1999 as Public Services Manager in charge of street, building, vehicle maintenance, and warehouse operations. He was promoted to Assistant Public Services Director in April 2001.

He succeeds Arlene Hildebrand, who was Public Services Director from April 2001 until March 2003. She retired in May.

Richardson previously worked for the cities of San Carlos, Suisun City, Piedmont, and Concord.

As Public Services Director, he oversees engineering, capital improvements, parks, open space, and maintenance of buildings, streets, City vehicles, and traffic control devices.

Staff at the Regional Center provided accommodations for more than 200 accredited media representatives to cover the debate (which was held in the Margaret Leshner Theatre) from TV monitors on the stage of the Hofmann Theatre. The event went off without incident.

Landscaping the right way

Choosing the right plants and landscape design can make a big difference in the amount of water, fertilizers and pesticides needed to keep lawns and gardens healthy.

Certain native plants are more pest resistant than others and, therefore, reduce the amount of pesticides needed. Proper irrigation techniques help, too. Avoid over-watering lawns and gardens, especially those that have been recently fertilized or have had pesticides applied as this causes the water to overflow into streets and storm drains.

Grasscycle to reuse what's natural. Grasscycling involves using a mulching mower which double cuts lawn clippings. The clippings fall back to the ground,

quickly decompose and then return valuable nutrients back to the soil, thus reducing the need for fertilizer. Also, less watering is needed because the

clippings cover the soil and reduce evaporation of water from the soil.

Composting. Now is a good time to start a compost pile.

They provide an excellent nitrogen source. With the Fall season nearing, you will have plenty of materials for your compost pile. Shred fallen

leaves with lawn mower, chipper or shredder and use them as mulch on beds or around plants.

Remember to rake leaves away from the storm drain to prevent clogged drainage.



Identity theft

“There’s no crime like it,” he said. “Why is it America’s fastest-growing crime? Because it’s where the money is.”

Approximately 7 million Americans last year were victims of identity theft, in which an impostor will use someone’s personal information — a Social Security number or a credit card account — to obtain goods and services.

But these cyber thieves don’t just take your money, said O’Farrell. They steal a victim’s credit reputation by destroying their credit rating. They create a living nightmare for innocent victims who can be wrongly investigated, charged, or even convicted of a crime they didn’t commit.

“We get tons of calls on identity theft on a regular basis,” said Lt. Mark Covington. “We’re trying to keep people from becoming victims through education and technology.”

The key ingredients for a theft are customer credit card records and employee payroll/Social Security records. O’Farrell said in most businesses, those records are completely unprotected.

The Walnut Creek Police Department has had most of its officers attend identity theft training as part of the Think Security First program. But the main thrust is to

educate the public.


“Our goal in Walnut Creek is not to make our city and community hack-proof, but instead to help our residents, businesses, and schools reduce their vulnerability to cybercrime by learning to Think Security First!,” said Chamber President Jay Hoyer.

O’Farrell cautions people to improve their computer security, guard their privacy, don’t open e-mails with viruses, and check their credit rating often.

“If you think you’ve been a victim, report the crime and red-flag your financial institutions,” he said.

- **When purchasing over the Internet, always be sure the site is secured and uses encryption**
